

National Child Protection Policy in Educational Institutions

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AIMS OF CHILD PROTECTION POLICY

- Create a safe and supportive school environment to protect the child.
- Protect them from physical abuse, emotional abuse, cyber attack, sexual abuse and exploitation, neglect and bullying.
- Promote students' health, welfare and well-being.



- Ensure implementation of mechanisms and measures of child protection in educational institutions
- Data protection of students by securing their personal information.
- Build awareness among students on their rights.
- Emphasize that all school staff are mandated reporters of cases of abuse whether inside or outside the school.



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CHILD PROTECTION AND SAFEGUARDING POLICY

All children have the right to be safe and protected, no matter their age, gender, race, culture, or disability.

Protecting children is everyone's responsibility at our school and this includes reporting any act committed by the parent, guardian or any other person, to a child enrolled in the school which results in neglect, physical or emotional injury or sexual harm.

- All staff have a duty and will report any suspected or disclosed issues of child protection to the Child Protection Officer(CPO)/ Child Protection Team(CPT).
- You can report child abuse by using the hotline number 116111.

Fundamental Right

 Right to have a name and nationality



Family Right

- Provide family safety
 requirements
- Special protection from any abuse or neglect

Right to Protection

- A child loses his parent
- Homelessness
- Continuous failure in education and care
- Sexually exploited or abused
- Exposing child to beggary



Types of abuse defined in the policy

- Physical Abuse
- Sexual Abuse
- Emotional Abuse
- Neglect





Physical Abuse

- Physical abuse is when a child is **intentionally harmed** through actions like hitting, shaking, burning, drowning, suffocating, or any act that causes injury, pain, or suffering.
- Signs and Symptoms:
- Unexplained or repeated injuries/burns
- Child avoids talking about injuries
- Afraid of parents being informed
- Scared of going home or of medical help
- Aggressive behavior towards others
 - Self-harming tendencies

Sexual Abuse

- Sexual Abuse: Involvement of a child in sexual activity, whether or not the child is aware of what is happening.
- There are three types of sexual offenses against children: rape, molestation, distribution or production or possession of child pornography
- Signs and Symptoms:
- Knows or talks about sexual things not suitable for age
- Sudder change in eating habits (loss of appetite or overeating)
- Withdrawn, isolated, or unable to concentrate
- Doesn't want to go home
- ngry outbursts or irritability
 - Overreacts to small criticisms

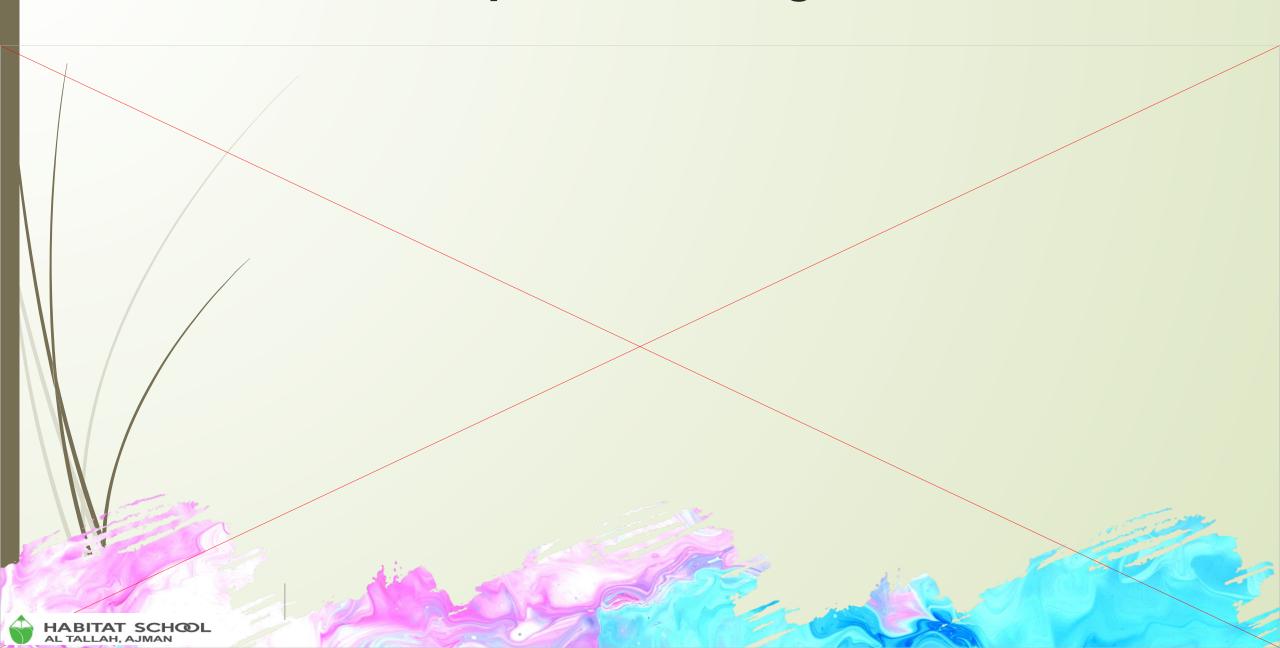
Emotional Abuse

- When a child is constantly made to feel unloved, worthless, or unwanted.
- It can also include setting expectations that are too high, scaring the child, or not giving them the emotional care they need.
 This affects the child's feelings, behavior, and development.
- ☐ Signs & Symptoms
- Slow growth in physical, emotional, or mental development
- Overreacting to small mistakes
- Pear of new situations
- Strange or inappropriate emotional responses
- Afraid of parents being contacted
- Very passive or very aggressive behavior

Neglect

- When parents or caregivers do not meet a child's basic needs, like food, clothing, shelter, medical care, safety, or emotional support.
 This can harm the child's health, growth, and development.
- ☐ Signs & Symptoms
- Always hungry
- Poor hygiene (unclean body/clothes)
- Constant tiredness
- Wears clothes in poor condition
- Frequently late or absent to school
- Medical needs not treated
- Low self-confidence

The Role of the Family in Protecting Children



FAMILY

- Families are the first line of defense in child protection.
- Parents play a crucial role in ensuring the physical, emotional, and psychological safety of children.
- •Child protection begins at home.

Key Roles of Parents in Child Protection

- Providing Safe Environment free from abuse, neglect, and exploitation.
- Meeting Basic Needs food, shelter, education, healthcare.
- Monitoring & Supervision awareness of child's friends, activities, and online use.
- **Emotional Support** building trust, open communication, and resilience.
- Modeling Good Behavior teaching respect, empathy, and responsibility.

Preventive Role of Parents

- Recognize warning signs of abuse or risky behavior.
- Educate children about safe and unsafe touch.
- Encourage children to speak up without fear.
- 1 Set **healthy boundaries** and rules at home.

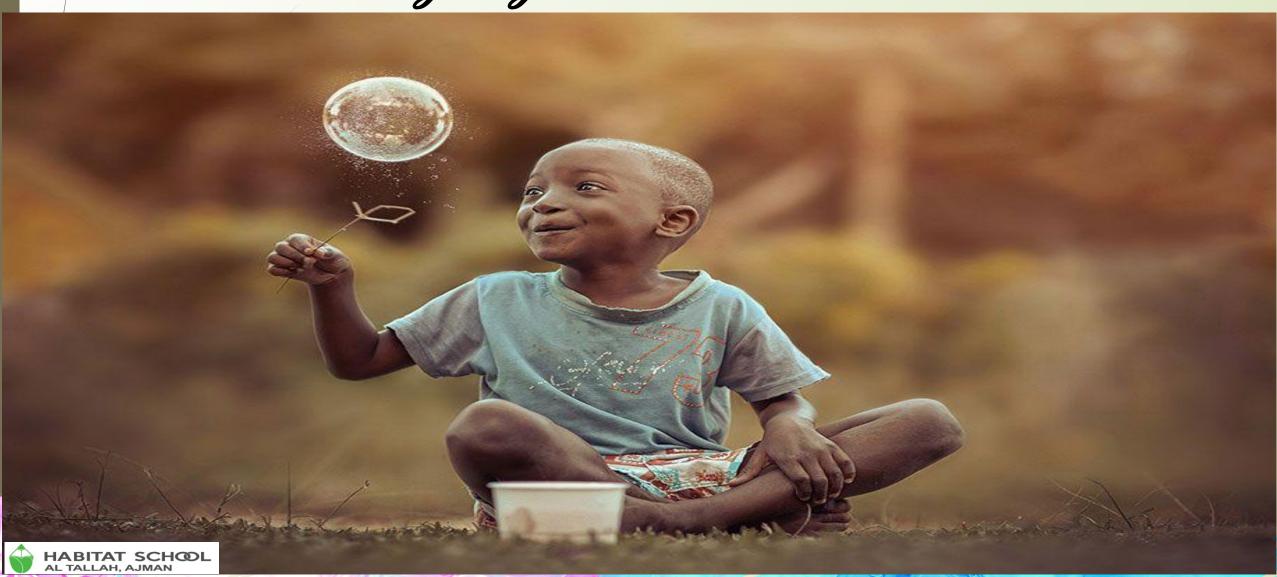
Collaboration with Schools & Community

- Attend parent workshops and training on child protection.
- Maintain good communication with teachers, counselors, and health professionals.
- Answer all inquiries about the student's behavior and academic performance and respond to their feedback and guidance.
- Report any concerns, observations, or changes in their student's behavior to the educational institution's principal, and/or board members, and/or to the relevant institution's staff.
- Be part of parent committees or child protection teams.
